Everyday plastic objects like buckets, tubs, children's toys, the housings of electric devices - all trash, plastic trash. The designer cuts these items up, cleans them, and rearranges them using grey polyurethane foam to make shelves, lamps and boards in useable furniture.

Cork and granulated cork are finely ground and pressed into blocks using synthetic resin or cut into shapes, including footballs, rugby balls, basketballs, handballs, volleyballs and medicine balls. The material is waterproof and wind resistant. Perfect for the seaside – where any other ball might sink or be blown away.

Old bleached, varnished and stained or cut boards from a builder's merchant or DIY store. Short boards and long ones, wide and narrow boards are mounted as they come, between three, four or five cast aluminium holders and then joined mechanically into tables. Special and always unique.

Garmento board is a very durable material that aesthetically represents the rustic Wild West. The material is as functional as any wood composite. It can be cut into parts and installed on a wooden or metal structure.

Sawdust is actually a powder with no form. When resin is added, it becomes wooden foam that can be shaped. And it is very durable. On the one hand it is smoothed out to make seats and backrests, and on the other to amorphous $% \left(1\right) =\left(1\right) \left(1\right)$ rounded shapes that are placed and fixed between the bars..

Roswitha Berger-Gentsch (DEU) Conical Neck Vessel 2012

Corrugated card, in single, double or triple layers, taken primarily from waste cardboard boxes from discount supermarkets like Lidl and Aldi, are cut into rings with very thin edges and then glued together in layers. Depending on how this is then used in the finished amphora, the edges can be continuously straight, slanting or just slightly angular. But always very precise. This work is done by hand, to exact measurements, with a great deal of patience. Over weeks and months. The result: a Roman-Germanic Federal-Republican. Completely unique.

Prei Shelf 01 2012

Paper, glue, and pulverized stone are soaked and mixed to produce a mash. This mash is filled into two simple but very precise brick moulds and then left to itself. The result is shelves, stools and other small items of furniture. As hard as stone.

El Ultimo Grito (GBR) FREE RANGE stools (2012) 2015

Cardboard boxes and corrugated cardboard boxes, squashed into blocks, made into stools, pressed. But only approximately - height and the seat are perfectly moulded. Using plastic fortified with glass fibre, they are stabilized and preserved. They are light, practical and robust. And each one is a little different.

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Juli Foos (FIN) Large Donut Rug 2012

White plastic bags, shaped into 201 "Donuts" using cardboard discs. Fat Donuts, all the same size. Soft and pleasant for the feet. All of them woven together with strips of colourful plastic, red, blue, green, yellow - in clear geometrical shapes. Almost oriental. And if needed, easy to repair.

Melted and extracted as pressed plastic through a jet nozzle, the material is then shaped by a robot into chairs, vases, and many other things, as programmed.

Skateboards, transportation made of multiplex cut to make for ski-shaped mobility. Never completely plane, always slightly curved - like a ski. Cut into single slats, they are used to make slim lampshades. With another cut, they can be small comfortable stools, perfectly fitting and ergonomic.

Micaella Pedros (GBR) Joining Bottles 2016

Builder's wood, logs, wooden scraps. Squared timber, wooden blocks and boards. Sorted, cleaned, reworked into ready-to-fit components and laid alongside each other. These loose parts are affixed with rings made out of PET bottles - joining bottles. Once in place, they only need to be heated, and small items of furniture are ready. Robust, stable and hardy. Just like builders' wood.

Tape: wide sticky tape, transparent, coloured, striped, or with advertising on it. Intended to be used just once. The moment it is applied it is already used up, almost rubbish already. Unless you see it as material that can be shaped and designed. Raw material that can be used to make bowls or buckets. That remains.

Diederik Schneemann (NLD) Flip Flop 2011

Flip-flops. A sole, a V-shaped strap. Done. And thus very cheap. Worn on the beach and by water, where they are then often left behind, washed away and then washed up again. Then collected. Glued together and cut into the shapes of lamps, baskets and small items of furniture.

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Janina Stübler (DEU) Football Carpet 2009

Seen geometrically, footballs are Buckminsterfullerenes, spherical molecules in pentagonal and hexagonal shapes. Only when combined, can a "ball" be formed, but pentagons alone cannot lead to complex forms. Hexa-gonal patches of leather by contrast form a patchwork, tiles, or carpet-like surface.

Domingos Tótora (BRA) Fruit Bowl with Friezes 2007

The product is made of cellulose pulp applied on moulds and dried in the sun. Workers use their hands to set the pulp, so that even though they are produced in series no object is identical to the next.



The designer places on iron feet seats made of recycled cardboard pulp with organic shapes alluding to stones found nearby.

Zhang Han & Sui Hao & Li Hua (CHN)

Melaleuca Chair No.1 2014

The product is made using the traditional process to produce multi-layered cloth shoes - an ancient Chinese craft. The technique is based on layers of cotton and uses emulsion for hardening, then sewing with linen thread. This design however uses smooth skin-friendly surface textures to replace the original rough textiles, making the chair more practical.

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Álvaro Catalán de Ocón (ESP)

Lamp PET Lamp

2019

The PET Lamp light is filled with recycled plastic bottles in order to give continuity to an object that, with a few minutes of useful life, takes centuries to decompose. The bottles serve as the basis for the pants, woven by hand with vegetable fibers in different parts of the world, which gives them unique finishes.

Ximo Roca & Bonestil (ESP)
Armchair Europa
1999

This armchair, with a beech wood structure, features a seat and backrest with a woven recycled paper. This material, which gives it a certain ductility, is reused in an unexpected and unconventional way. Its author designed, as a complement, a bench to rest the feet on, also made of beech wood and recycled paper.

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Vaho & Vaho Works SL (ESP) Bag Tóquio 1999

This bag, designed to be hung, is made from the PVC advertising banners that are hung on the lampposts in the streets of Barcelona. Once clean, the fabrics are cut and sewn to give life to new objects, such as cases, wallets, purses or bags like this one. Advertising, once obvious, now becomes a fragmented message for the new recycled object.

Nani Marquina i Ariadna Miquel & Nani-marquina (ESP)

Rug Bicicleta 2005

This rug, of considerable dimensions and great presence, is made from rubber bicycle inner tubes. It is a conceptual, sustainable and original object. Each carpet uses between 130 and 140 inner tubes from tires, collected and handled in India. The material is 100% recycled and its design has a clear intention to care for the environment.

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Curro Claret (ESP)
Suspension lamp Porex
2001

This lamp reuses the Porexpan packaging protection used to transport bulky objects. You can make both lights and protections if you want to recycle, always according to the shapes and possibilities of each one. The author installs the lamp holders and a wiring for its suspension. The result is a surprising, original object that gives new life to a material intended for single use.
